




## PREFACE

Dear Mother Magdalen Aimée, I have read with great interest and much edification the excellent Life of your Mother Foundress. I fancy that there are few now living that can remember her before God called her to be the Founder of your Congregation, which under His Providence and protection has done such good work for the Church in many countries. I can say that I remember her at Bayswater, where in company of other converts of the early sixties she frequently came to see Dr. Manning, afterwards the Cardinal Archbishop of Westminster. It was just before her sister was married to Mr., or as we always called him, Dr. Dean. Though of course as a youngster I never had anything to say to the Taylors personally, I used frequently to see her, and years afterwards I remember talking to her in Rome of my recollection of those days, and she was good enough to say that she recalled having seen me at St. Mary of the Angels, Bayswater.

The Life strikes me, if I may say so, as having been done by the author very well, and certainly it is full of incidents which keep up the interest of the narrative till the end. I hope it may have a big circulation, and show to all the wonderful devoted life of your venerable Mother for God and His poor.
